The Woody is in the water and taking people on cruises on the Hudson. The Woody participated in the Cornwall Festival, the Clearwater Revival, and the Strawberry Festival.

Storage Space at the University Settlement Camp:

We have a signed contract with the City of Beacon for storage space at the camp at no charge. Congratulations to David Cohen and Saul for their work in getting this done.

Festivals:

Our next festival is the **Corn Festival Sunday August 10th 12-5PM**. Volunteers are needed. We do not have time to wait to the next meeting to recruit volunteers. Please contact one of the Board members to volunteer.

Clearwater Report:

Eric Marsh President of the Clearwater Board was in attendance and made himself available to answer questions. Clearwater is undergoing major changes. They will be moving to the University Settlement Camp. The annual meeting will be held at the Settlement Camp this fall. Clearwater needs an endowment fund and they are beginning the process of raising several million dollars to create this fund.

Executive Committee Meeting Minutes

Tuesday, June 24, 2008

The meeting was held at the Beacon Sloop Club at 7:30 p.m. with Saul Rozinsky presiding.

Secretary Dave Eberle was not in attendance; Jim Finnigan recreated notes from memory.

Strawberry Fest:

The festival receipts were over \$10,000, with a preliminary profit of about \$7000. Vendor fees income and some expenses are still outstanding. A preliminary report is attached.

Pete Seeger suggested that the festival could have made more money by selling more strawberry shortcakes if adequate whipped cream could have been made. Pete said that Toshi said that 48 quarts of cream was not enough, and that 64 quarts should have been bought. NEW INFORMATION: Toshi bought 64 quarts, Jim Finnigan has the receipt for it, and so if 64 quarts were not at the Strawberry Tent, then 16 quarts were lost or purloined.

It was also reported that Strawberry Smoothies could have made more money if enough bananas were on hand.

It was discussed that smaller, local berries required more effort to hull, generated more waste and were not particularly an improvement in taste.

The new Strawberry Tent needed a new center pole to be made, which was expeditiously done during site set-up. Saul will organize work parties over the upcoming weeks to finish and enhance the pole for future use.

Clearwater Revival:

Because of the organizing and resources needed for the Strawberry Festival, the sloop club was not adequately represented at this year's Revival, and waterfront coordination was seen as wanting improvement. It was suggested that this was partially due to our commitments to sail the Woody, and to serve on various committees including Communications and Recycling. A suggestion was made to ask for someone to volunteer to be a BSC-Revival Festival coordinator next year.

Storage:

David Cohen and Saul are chasing down the city administrator, and maybe will ping the mayor, about getting our promised storage space at the Settlement Camp. We would like to be able to use the space before our July 4 membership meeting, to store the stuff that has been temporarily put in the children's area.

Building:

Fran Sansone and her family are doing a massive cleanup of the building. David and Saul are trying to contact her to find out when the curtains will be brought back, when the decorations will be re-hung, and so forth. A Hudson River Watershed meeting is schedule to happen at the club on July 1.

New business:

A motion was made, amended and passed to buy a dinghy – preferably, a used dinghy that meets our specifications (Duranautic-like, 14 feet, stable, two sets of oarlocks i.e., can be rowed by two rowers sitting on different benches, cheap), but if one cannot be found in two weeks, then a new Duranautic can be purchased by a local dealer who offered us a 15% discount. Once acquired, the dinghy should be painted, branded et cetera with Beacon Sloop Club identification markings.

Boat Education Bag

Beginning during July, the BSC Environmental Committee will be providing a boat education bag to assist in providing information for guests during sails. One of the central items available in the bag is a categorized notebook containing laminated photos and information pertinent to many of the things guests will see while sailing on the Woody.

Categories in the notebook include historical/current photos of Denning's Point, the Beacon-Newburgh Ferry, Long Dock Beacon, Riverfront Park, as well as basic information about the Sloop Club, the Woody, Hudson River wildlife, and some other basic nautical "know how."

The book is being viewed as a living and developing resource that will change and develop over time. Volunteers from the Environmental Committee will also be available on sails to help facilitate conversation about the information in the notebook as well the other items available in the "boat bag." These other items will include various "hand's on" materials to help bring the Hudson River, concern for the environment, and the sailing experience to life for our guests (such as knot tying resources, a brick from Denning Point, etc.) If you have any small educational materials that you would be willing to donate (such as any Hudson River/Sloop Club photographs that we could digitize and add to the notebook or other items that pertain to Hudson River life) we would welcome the additional resources. 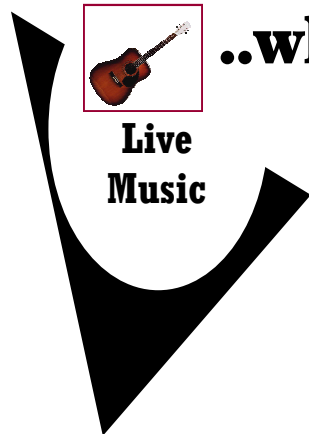
